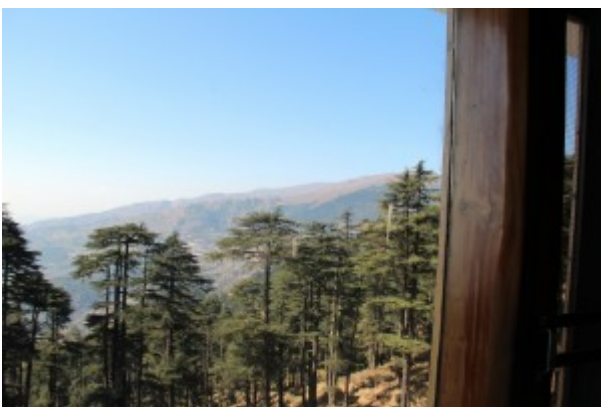
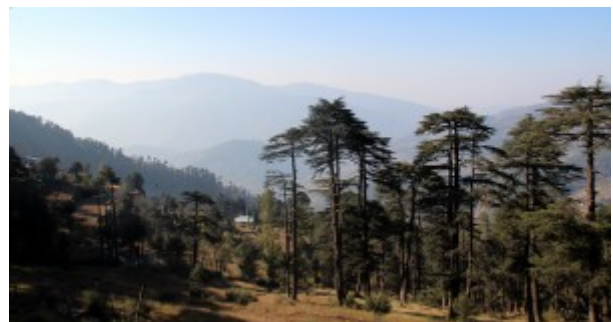


Patnitop : A Reluctant Journey
